Happy 50th Birthday to the Internet

On October 29, 1969, a UCLA computer programmer named Charley Kline sent an electronic message to Bill Duvall at the Stanford Research Institute. This was the first time an electronic message was sent over a network from one computer to another, which is why Internet Day is celebrated annually on October 29 and why 2019 marks the internet's 50th birthday.

At the time, the internet was known as ARPANET (Advanced Research Projects Agency Network). It's also interesting to note that the initial message didn't go entirely as planned. Kline intended to send the word 'LOGIN," but only the letters "L" and "O" were transmitted across to Duvall before the system crashed.

The internet has certainly aged well and is getting better all the time. It's revolutionized how we work, learn, share information, communicate, shop, entertain ourselves, meet people, and much more. Can you imagine life without it?

Prevent Unauthorized Users on Your Home's Wi-Fi Network

If you don't take precautions, your home's Wi-Fi network could be used by neighbors trying to avoid paying for their own internet service. Or worse yet, picked up by "drive-by leeches" planning to introduce malware or access illegal websites. Either way, use of your Wi-Fi network by people outside your household can slow down your internet speed.

To help prevent unauthorized Wi-Fi access, make sure your home's network is as secure as it can be. Take these key precautions:

Turn on WPA2 encryption on your wireless router.

If you haven't already done so, consult your wireless router's manual and enable WPA2 encryption on your wireless router. Make sure you're not using the outdated and vulnerable WEP encryption. WEP is easily hacked by even the most novice hacker in less than a minute or two by using free tools found on the internet. Turn on WPA2 encryption and set a strong password for your network. The moment the router requires a new password that the connected devices don't know, all the free-loaders will disconnect from your network, unable to use your internet connection.

Hide your wireless network by changing its name (SSID).

Your SSID is the name that you give your wireless network. You should always change this name from its manufacturer set default which is usually the brand name of the router (i.e. Linksys, Netgear, D-link, etc.). Changing the name helps to prevent hackers and leeches from finding specific vulnerabilities associated with your brand of router. If hackers know the brand name, then they could find an exploit to use against

it (if one exists). Make the SSID something random and as long as you can, since it helps prevent hackers from cracking your wireless encryption.

While there's no way to make your home's Wi-Fi network totally impervious to a dedicated hacker with the right tools and skills, if you layer enough security practices, the hacker will likely move on to another, easier-to-access network in the neighborhood.

Scam Pop-Up Ads Claim to be From KMTelecom

We recently had a customer report that while he was on the WebMD website, a pop-up ad claiming to be from KMTelecom said, "Congratulations! You get to spin the wheel to win a prize." When he spun the wheel, he was told he'd won \$1,000.00 and should push the button on the screen to be connected to a "partner." Wisely, he didn't follow through but called KMTelecom to report the scam.

KMTelecom never uses pop-up ads on websites belonging to other businesses or organizations. So if you see one claiming to be from us, it's fraudulent. Do not respond to it in any way or click on any buttons or links.

Scam pop-up ads happen occasionally to KMTelecom but are part of a much larger and more frequent issue. These ads are the result of malicious code being inserted into the software that virtually all publisher websites use in order to run fast-loading automated ads. It's a seemingly never-ending battle. Hackers will devise a way to interfere with your browsing, publishers will combat it as best they can, and hackers will come up with something new.

- A single worker honeybee produces approximately 1/12 of a teaspoon of honey in her lifetime. That means around 22,700 bees are needed to fill a single jar of honey.
- For every pound of honey, honeybees must tap over two million flowers.
- The color and flavor of honeys differ depending on the nectar source (the blossoms) visited by the honeybees. There are more than 300 unique types of honey available in the United States.
- Dating back to ancient times, honey has been used for its medicinal purposes. When you have a cough, try reaching for a jar of honey, since the World Health Organization says honey can coat and soothe throat irritation.

Hands-Free Law Effective August 1st

The new "hands-free" law went into effect August 1st, 2019, and KMTelecom is helping to spread the word.

Here are a few important facts about the new law:

- You may not hold a phone in your hand while driving.
- The new law allows a driver to use their cell phone to make calls, text, listen to music or podcasts and get directions, but only by voice commands without holding the phone. A driver may not use their phone at any time for video calling, video live-streaming, Snapchat, gaming, looking at video or photos, using apps, reading texts, scrolling or typing on the phone.
- In an emergency, you can hold a phone to call 911.
- The first ticket is \$50 plus court fees and the second and later tickets are \$275 plus court fees.


